Help Us Save More Lives

In 2024, Second Chance will enter its 30th year of saving lives. When we incorporated in 1994, there were only a handful of rescues in Minnesota. Now, there are a few hundred. This past year has been the most difficult year we have seen in the last 20 years with the number of strays in impounds at risk of euthanasia, people wanting to surrender their animals, and animals suffering on the streets. Rescues are overextended and begging

for help to save them which means all of us need fosters, adopters, volunteers, and funding. We will continue helping the neediest and are looking forward to another year of helping dogs, cats and people, but we cannot save more lives without a community of volunteers. If you can open your home to fostering a cat, dog or kitten, please let us know. Now is the time to get involved.

In this newsletter, we are highlighting just a few of the cats we rescued in 2023 who needed extra veterinary and foster care. Being a stray out on the streets exposes cats to horrible injuries and diseases. Please don't let your cats outside.

Journey the Survivor

Journey came into our program as a thin and injured stray. Something terrible happened to his front and back right paws



which looked like the skin had been burned off. The skin was eaten away and just flesh and bones were visible on his front foot. We wanted to save the paws so the vet tried honey wraps daily, and then every few days and then weekly.

Through all of this pain and paw wraps, Journey was the



sweetest boy, purring and wanting to be cuddled. Everyone who met him, fell in love. After a couple months of wraps and recovery, new skin grew back and Journey was able to walk and play without pain. He is a lucky boy who was adopted into a wonderful forever home.

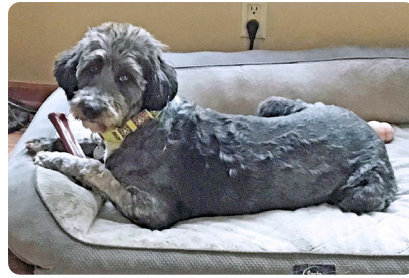

A call quickly came in and Scarlett was adopted. Her foster mom thought this latest fostering chapter was closed until she was notified a few days later that Scarlett escaped from her new home. On the run in a new, busy city, Scarlett was spotted here and there by people but evaded capture — she was so terrified she wouldn't even get close to people. Her foster family drove for hours searching for her, calling her name, and asking people in the community to be on the lookout. After another exhausting day of searching, Scarlett's foster family decided to make the trip home to rest and regroup — it had been a long, stressful day and everyone needed a break. Once they arrived home, they received a call that a dog matching the description of Scarlett



had been spotted. Rest can wait. They hopped back in the car and drove to the location. A dog was resting in someone's back yard and each time the homeowner tried to approach the

dog, it would dash off. The foster family arrived and immediately knew that was Scarlett sitting below the trees in the yard. After her time on the run in an unfamiliar city, Scarlett was justifiably nervous about approaching anyone, including her foster mom. Being a seasoned dog owner and rescue volunteer, Scarlett's foster mom expected this and came prepared — she pulled a Twinkie out of her pocket and started unwrapping the treat. Scarlett, hearing that familiar rustle of plastic and seeing her foster mom enjoying a treat they once shared, she couldn't help herself — she rushed over to her foster mom and as she took a piece of that beloved Twinkie, her foster mom quickly slipped a leash around her. Darla Has a Special Heart



Darla came from a hoarding situation — we took her and several other kittens into our

program and provided the vet work that they badly needed.

Darla was always a happy kitten and didn't show any signs of being sick. But, at one of her health checks, the vet noticed an abnormal heart beat. After seeing a specialist and having an echocardiogram, it was determined that Darla had a heart defect. She had a grade 5 heart murmur caused by, they believe,

a ventricular septal defect (VSD) which is one of the more common congenital heart defects in cats (sometimes referred to as a 'hole in the heart'). A second echocardiogram was performed several months later and there were no changes so Darla went up for adoption. There is no way of knowing what Darla's long-term health will be, but she doesn't know she is any different from all the other cats. An amazing couple saw Darla's story, went to visit her, immediately fell in love with her fun personality, and adopted her!

Mabel Sees Just Fine

Mabel is a kitten who came from animal control as a stray. She was a normal playful kitten who loved chasing her toys around the house. One of her favorite pastimes was sitting on the window sill watching the birds outside.

And, she was the first one to spot a fly! When she went in for her spay appointment, the vet noticed



Mabel had cataracts in both eyes. So, off to an ophthalmologist she went. She was diagnosed with juvenile cataracts and treated with eye drops twice a week for four months. Mabel's recheck was great with no change and no inflammation so the cataracts were not progressing.

We don't know if this will ever progress or not but Mabel was well worth taking a chance on by the very happy couple who adopted her...and the other cats in their home who are Mabel's friends.
